From the Chaplain, John Burke Building on the Rock...

When we were building our house a number of years ago, we had to drill some holes down into the earth so that the building was built on a firm foundation. Here is a picture of that happening at



the time. The other pictures are of the house part built with the straw bale walls up and then with the straw bale walls rendered for protection.





When houses are built it is good to ensure that they are built correctly on the right foundation so that they stand for a very long time. Ours has now been there for about 15 years and still going strong.

Jesus told a parable, (an earthly story with a spiritual meaning), similar to this in the Bible, in the book of Matthew Chapter 7 and verses 24 to 27 where He said-

'Therefore everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock. The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house; yet it did not fall, because it had its foundation on the rock. But every one who hears these words of mine and does not put them into practice is like a foolish man who built his house on sand. The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell with a great crash.'

The point being that the storms and winds of life come and go at different times for everyone. What Jesus is saying here is that having the foundation of our lives set on Him means that there is a different perspective when those things happen. It doesn't mean that they will necessarily disappear, or that they won't be hard to go through but it means that we can know that there is something greater underneath it all- God always loves us and cares for us through Jesus.

It's just like that with our house as well. To look at it now you wouldn't even know that those big holes filled with concrete are even under the house providing a good foundation and holding it firm when the wind and storms come. Building on something dependable and secure is the key, spiritually, personally and also when constructing something.



Wishing you every blessing over the Easter period, remembering the death and resurrection of Jesus for us all.

School Happenings...

Yr 5 and 6 Camp to Canberra

The students of years 5 and 6 went to a camp in Canberra in early March for three days. We went to many places: some fun, some educational.

On day 1, we went to The National Portrait Gallery. Our tour guide showed us lots of exciting portraits and told us about the stories behind them.

On day 2, we travelled to a building where they held the War Memorial. We split into different groups. Year 5 went with their tour guide, and 6 with theirs.

We learnt about many bold soldiers, fearless dogs and warplanes. We were all very excited when we were asked to take part in the War Memorial Ceremony! We sat by a small pool where the Eternal Flame licked the water's surface.

We went through a variety of rooms where we could interact with other children and play with experiments to learn the science behind them. In the final room, we experienced one of the scariest things ever. We went down a massive slide at will. Our hands were sweaty as we clutched the pole and dropped down the two-storey slide.

The students in Years 5 and 6 went on a camp to Canberra in early March for three days. We went to many different places, including Parliament House, POD playground, which was the same place we did orienteering and Greenhills campsite.

When we went to Parliament House, we had a tour guide to visit the House of Representatives, where we learned about the colours of the chamber. There was one main colour in the room: a dark teal fading to white and just one shade of teal, a light teal. They chose the colour because it represents gum leaves. The tour guide also took us into the Senate, where we learned about the colour, representing gum leaves only when they have fallen. We also talked and asked questions about the big chair below the Coat of Arms, where the Monarch sits, and when they are unavailable, the governor general sits in the chair. Everybody was very excited because afterwards we visited the roof of Parliament House and looked up at the giant Australian flag.

We also visited the POD playground, where the class had a great time playing a big game called Tip. We then played on all the equipment. Afterwards, we had a tour guide take us to the National Arboretum. She explained to us the meaning of the Arboretum, a botanical garden devoted mainly to trees and looking after plants. In groups of 2 or 3, we then had a short amount of time to do orienteering. There was a large area to find them, each number having varied points.

The campsite where we stayed was called Greenhills campsite. The accommodation was very clean, and we also had our own bathroom. There was a soccer field where lots of kangaroos gathered in the evening. We played a game called Foot Ninja, which is technically a game of Tip with your feet. Then, we had a trivia night about the earth, animals, and food.

Everybody had a great time going to all of these places and learned a lot of new interesting facts. **by lvy Decker**








Pi Day
